Early Colporteur Book Re-Discovered! Giving New Meaning to Selling BIG Books!




Walter Harper was one of the earliest Seventh-day Adventist colporteurs. Converted in 1879 while he was in the dry goods business, he initially resisted the idea of selling Adventist literature because he thought "the public will not buy our books." He was mentored by George A. King and others and traveled west to California where on May 8, 1881, while in Fresno County, he sold a copy of Dr. J. H. Kellogg's large book, *Home Hand Book of Health and Medicine*. He sold \$26 of literature total on that very first day! That first copy was purchased by Mary Archambeau (1849-1932) which resulted ultimately in her conversion to the Seventh-day Adventist faith.



After about 18 months he went to San Luis Obispo where he sold other Adventist literature, and subsequently traveled to Oregon and Washington, where he became enthusiastic in sharing Adventist literature. His favorite book was distributing *The Great Controversy* which he believed was "the heaven-sent torch of truth." Despite some personal challenges, he would continue distributing Adventist literature into old age and is widely regarded as the founder of the colporteur work in Adventism west of the Mississippi River in North America.

A copy of the 1881 edition of *Home Hand Book of Health and Medicine* is in the vault at Pacific Press Publishing Association in Nampa, Idaho.

El Centinela Turns 120

In 1874, James White, accompanied by a group of visionaries, founded the Pacific Press, the Adventist Church's second publishing house. Their vision was clear and ambitious: to produce a magazine discussing the signs of the times. Little did they know, they were embarking on an iconic journey that would span both time and borders.

This missionary endeavor first cast its light in Mayagüez, Puerto Rico, in 1903, spearheaded by Brenton E. Connerly and Santiago Jordán. Dubbed "El Centinela de la Verdad," this publication stood as a beacon defending biblical truths and the gospel of Jesus Christ.



But as is common in grand tales, adversity was not far behind. In 1911, a massive fire ravaged the city of Cristóbal, consuming the building where "El Centinela de la Verdad" was crafted. However, the flames couldn't quell the spirit and mission of these devoted missionaries.

Simultaneously in Mexico, "El Amigo de la Verdad" was shedding light upon homes, steered by the erudite George W. Caviness, a linguist whose love for languages forged connections between cultures and beliefs centered on faith. This magazine eventually evolved into "El Mensajero de la Verdad," and later, "Las Señales de los Tiempos."

Reflecting on the history and impact of these publications, the Pacific Press, in 1919, resolved to introduce "El Centinela." Over the years, this magazine emerged as a luminous guide for Spanishspeaking readers, now recognized as the oldest Hispanic religious magazine in the United States.

The odyssey of "El Centinela" is replete with adventures. From its inception in California, its journey through Panama, its residency in Illinois, its return to California, and its present location in Idaho—every page bears testimony to its steadfast mission: proclaiming the message of salvation and the anticipation of Jesus's second coming.



Now, in a world riddled with crises, despair, and uncertainties, "El Centinela" persists as a testament to divine assurance and a call to faith. It reminds us that even in the bleakest times, a guiding light always shines. This narrative merits sharing, experiencing, and above all, disseminating. As they often emphasize, they aren't merely commemorating anniversaries or relics but transforming hearts and minds. This is the legend of El Centinela, dedicated to family, health, and faith.
